One of the best known residents of Oxford township died on Monday last, in the person of Henry Anderson. He had reached the advanced age of 78 at the time of his demise. Some two years ago he experienced an attack of pneumonia and though he recovered physically, it was only with impaired mental power. He was accordingly sent to Brockville for treatment and has since remained there. Some little time ago the cheering news received that Mr. Anderson was rapidly recovering and that his return home might be expected shortly. But death intervened and on Monday came the news of a sadder home coming than had been hoped for. The remains were conveyed to his late residence at Oxford Mills and the funeral is being held there this Thursday morning. The service takes place in St. John's church at 10 o'clock interment to be made in the Oxford Mills cemetery. The late Henry Anderson was an Englishman by birth, emigrating to Canada when only ten years old. For some five or six years he was employed in the Cossitt works at Smith's Falls and afterwards took up farming which he was actively engaged in until a few years ago, when he disposed of his farm near Oxford Mills. He was a devout member of the Anglican church. Deceased is survived by a widow and six children: Miss Lucy A. Anderson of town; J. Sexton Anderson of Seattle; W.H. Anderson (ex-Counties Commissioner) of town; the Right Rev. Charles Palmerson Anderson of Chicago; James Anderson who is a commercial traveller with headquarters at Baltimore; and Miss Jessie Anderson of Chicago.

The old gentleman was out in the yard when the undertakers were on their way to take charge of the remains of Mr. Robinson and on their way back they were called upon to take charge of his also. It appears that on Saturday his wife had gone over to a neighbour's house for a short time leaving her husband and young child alone. Shortly after she left he was attacked with a fainting fit and before the little one could summon help he had expired. He was 77 years of age and was not in very good health and it is thought that he was attacked by heart failure. The funeral took place on Monday at 1:30 p.m. from the Methodist church, service being conducted by Rev. J. Cornell. 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Mr. Barnes death occurred very suddenly and unexpectedly early on the morning of Wednesday Jan. 9th. Heart disease was the cause. The funeral was delayed for some days to await the arrival of his brothers who live in the same state. These are Thomas of Sta. Rosa, and James and John of Cloverdale. Another brother and four sisters survive him, all of whom reside in Kemptville: Mrs. R.H. Bedingfield; Mrs. John Sanders; Mrs. J.C. Bedingfield; Mrs. J. Proctor, and Wm. A. Barnes. Alexander W. Barnes was born in our town forty-nine years ago and some time since journeyed to the far west. Both the Victoria, B.C., dailies contain lengthy illustrated sketches of the late John Fannin but lack of space compels us to omit the publication of these in full. The following is from the Victoria Times: "John Fannin was in the Cariboo country during the gold excitement and led many hunting parties through the wilds of this province and the Dawson district. His life was replete with interesting experiences but he was never forward in speaking of these for his was a very modest disposition. A kindly, simple heart ceased to beat with the dissolution of John Fannin. The museum he founded stands as a monument to his memory and a testimony to his

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sympathies with all the created things of nature"

Kemptville's oldest pioneer, in the sense that he has been long and prominently connected with the affairs of the town, was removed by the death, on Tuesday of this week, of George Sanderson. He was aged 95 years and for the past three-quarters of a century had played an important part in the industrial, religious, and municipal life of the town. During a long and very active life in Kemptville it was his to bear an unsullied reputation as a man of integrity and sterling worth. It was with deep regret therefore that the citizens of our town learned of his serious illness some little time ago. During the past week it was very evident that the end could not be far off. On Tuesday morning he was much worse and at 11 a.m. the end came. The late George Sanderson was born on April 25th, 1808, in Berwickshire, Scotland, and was therefore just 95 years of age last Saturday. At the age of 23 he married Miss Mary Clarke and together they came to Canada on their wedding trip, locating at Kemptville in 1831, in that house at the lower end of Clothier street where the father has since resided continuously. The first summer the Methodist people were beginning the erection of a church, and Mr. Sanderson undertook the supervision of the carpenter work. He followed the business of a carpenter and joiner and took many contracts for the erection of buildings in Kemptville, South Gower, and Oxford. He took an active and prominent part in the public affairs of Kemptville and when the village was incorporated in 1857 was a member of the first village council, a position which he afterwards held on several occasions always with credit and distinction. He became early connected with the Methodist church here and was for

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many years a respected class-leader and member of the official board of that church.
