The deceased had for the past twenty-five years been a sufferer from that dread malady, cancer, and during that long period she was never known to have uttered a complaint or made a protest, although at times her pain must have been well nigh past endurance but she bore it with a true Christian fortitude. The deceased was born in Kemptville on November 19th, 1862, and lived her life in the village, being a daughter of the late Henry Agnew. She was married on the 12th of January, 1898, to Mr. Abram Acton who predeceased her some eight years ago. She was a lifelong member of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, and was an active worker in the various societies connected with it as long as her malady permitted her to be around. For the past eight months she has been confined to her bed totally blind. Her mother, two sisters and one brother survive, the sisters being: Mrs. T.R. Brownlee of Ottawa; and Miss Ida of town. The brother is George Agnew of Mercer, Cal. The funeral took place from her late residence on Asa Strret on Tuesday, September 1st., service being conducted at the house by Rev. P.A. McLeod, D.D., interment being in the Union cemetery. Many beautiful flowers were sent by her friends and the friends of her relatives in token of sympathy and the high esteem the deceased had been held in the community where her life had been spent and where she had borne her sufferings in a manner that ought to put to shame those who survive and are apt to complain of their lot.</p> <p>Kemptville Weekly Advance, September 3, 1914. Agnew, Kemptville,</p> <p>On Saturday, Jan. 20th, there passed away at his home here, a lifelong and highly respected citizen of Kemptville, in the person of Mr. Henry Agnew, aged 74 years. The late Mr. Agnew was born in Cornwall, and has been a resident of Kemptville upwards of sixty years. In May of 1862 he was united in marriage to Miss Janet Spotswood, by the Rev. Mr. Quinn, then pastor of St. Paul's Presbyterian church here. Mr. and Mrs. Agnew would have been fifty years married in May of this year. Of this union there were born three daughters and two sons: Mrs. Elizabeth Acton, Kemptville; George, California; Mrs. Brownlee, Ottawa; Dr. William who passed away a year ago in November; and Miss Ida at home. He is also survived by one brother, Mr. John Agnew of Kemptville, with whom he has been in partnership in the wagon-making business for the past 45 years. He was a member of the school board for seventeen years, one of the members when the high school was built. He was quiet and unassuming but</p>				

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possessed sterling qualities. He had been in failing health for the past two years, but was able to be about until a week before his death when he was stricken with pneumonia from which he never rallied and passed peacefully away on the date mentioned. The funeral was held at his late residence on Asa street, on Monday Jan. 22nd. Rev. C.C. Salisbury officiated and interment was made in the Public cemetery, Kemptville. In the death of Chester Banks which occurred on Wednesday, the 25th of March, Kemptville loses one of her best known citizens. Mr. Banks was born in the township of Oxford, about ten miles west of Kemptville, on December 13th, 1833. On Dec. 11, 1856, he married Ellen Johnston, daughter of the late Lancelot Johnston and began life on a farm just adjoining his father's home which they occupied till the spring of 1873, when he removed to Kemptville where he established what is known to this day as the "Banks Livery". He continued in this business for twenty-three years and sold out just eighteen years ago this month to his sons, L.J. and Chas. H. Banks. Since this time he has lived a retired life, looking after the interests of a farm which he owned quite near the village. On Monday, 23rd. of March, he was taken sick with pneumonia and passed away two days later. The funeral was held on Friday, 27 March to St. James' Church, where service was conducted by the Rector, Rev. R.J. Dumbrille. Interment in the Church cemetery. The deceased was survived by his widow, two sons and three daughters, also two brothers and a sister in Iowa.

In Denver, Col., at the home of her daughter Mrs. C.P. Jackson, there died on the 23rd of April inst., Mrs. Catherine Elizabeth Banks, a life long resident of Kemptville. Mrs. Banks went with her daughters Nellie and Vera, to Regina, Sask., just about one year ago. Her health had not been the best for a long while and was not improved by the change. After several months of suffering and one or two operations in the hospital in Regina, she removed to the home of her daughter in Denver, hoping the milder climate would aid in restoring her impaired health. But all the kindness and care of daughter and son-in-law and the best skill of Denver doctors and hospitals failed and after severe suffering and a plucky fight she at last succumbed. Kate Ault, as we knew her in former days, was born at Wellington (now Kars) about 53 years ago and was the daughter of Isaiah Ault and his wife, Mary Ann Buchanan. In her early childhood the family removed to Kemptville. Here in May 1892, she became the wife of Lancelot J. Banks, who predeceased her in March 1901. Excepting a residence of a few years in Omaha, Neb. shortly after their marriage, they lived their years out in Kemptville. One son, Raymond and one daughter, Nellie,

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live in Regina, Sask., and two daughters, Ida (Mrs. Jackson) and Vera live in Denver, Col. Katie's sunny smile, kind heart and quiet ways always made her friends. Her industry was phenomenal and those of us whose privilege it has been to be associated with her in life, have had our lives brightened in the enjoyment of that privilege. The body will arrive in Kemptville for interment late this week and arrangements will be announced later.

Marie, Ont., Mrs. Tertius Barnes was well known to most of the Weekly Advance readers who were shocked to hear of her demise, at her home at the Soo on Friday 1st. inst. The remains were brought home to Kemptville Monday the funeral service being held in the Methodist church immediately after the arrival of the morning train, when the pastor, Rev. S.J. Hughes, M.A., officiated. Interment was made in the Kemptville Public Cemetery. The late Mrs. Barnes was born on the Workman Homestead near the South Gower-Mountain line in May 1847. Her father was the late William Workman, Esquire, and her maiden name was Susannah Workman. As a girl she attended Kemptville Grammar School. In 1871 she was united in marriage to Mr. Barnes; they lived in Kemptville continuously up to three years ago when they removed to Sault Ste. Marie to be with their sons Theron and Howard. Mrs. Barnes was a woman of domestic tastes and her public activity was in connection with church work, she being a devoted member of the Methodist Church here. On her removal to Sault Ste. Marie, the Women's Missionary Society conferred

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upon her the Honorary Degree of Life Membership. The late Mrs. Barnes' death was due to a sudden collapse following seven weeks illness from typhoid fever. Surviving members of the family are: her husband; Miss Elena, the only daughter; and Messrs.  One of the brightest young men Kemptville has yet produced, passed away at Gravenhurst Sanatorium on Thursday, 22nd inst., in the person of Mr. W.H. Brownlee, M.A., principal of Claresholm (Alberta) High School. Cut off in his prime by tuberculosis, his death makes the first break in the family circle of nine members, of whom the survivors are, however, scattered far and wide over the continent. Mr. Brownlee's illness was of but three months duration. His passing removes a brilliant young man of rare talent and achievement, whose future seemed very bright with

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promise. He had been a manly, kindly boy, here at home. Going out into the world he grew into a scholarly, noble, Christian manhood. His early death will be mourned by many for he was greatly beloved. Hugh Wallace Brownlee was born in Kemptville in 1880, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Brownlee. He had a brilliant career at Kemptville Public and High Schools and Ottawa Normal, subsequently teaching at Kars and Ottawa. He is remembered in the Capital as a teacher of rare ability and success and there, as in Kemptville, was a popular member of youthful society. He also found time to pursue university studies and in 1904 he took his degree of Arts Bachelor; in 1908, the Master. In the latter year he was united in marriage to Miss Nina Kerr of Kars and they removed to Claresholm, Alberta, where they have since made their home. Last autumn Mr. Brownlee was taken ill and he resigned his position in November. Early in January it became evident that the trouble was tubercular and he came to Gravenhurst Sanitorium for treatment. Mrs. Brownlee followed as soon as she could with their only child, Charlie, a bright and lusty boy of sixteen months. While spending a day with her parents in Manitoba, Mrs. Brownlee was shocked to have the boy stricken with cerebrospinal meningitis, of which he died on February 10th. Immediately after the funeral she hastened to her husband being accompanied by his sister, Mrs. (Dr) Smith of Thompson, North Dakota. They were delayed by storms and arrived in Toronto Saturday evening to be met by Mr. Brownlee's body, for he had passed away at Gravenhurst forty-eight hours before. The remains were brought to Kemptville and the funeral held on Monday afternoon, service being conducted at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Shaw, North Rideau street. The late Mr. brownlee is survived by five sisters and three brothers: Mrs. (Dr) Smith and Miss Nina Brownlee of Thompson, N.D.; Mrs. F.B.
