Anderson received news last week that Mr. Anderson's brother, Peter, had been injured by an automobile in Detroit and they left immediately for that city. There they found Mr. Anderson in a hospital, suffering from injuries from being struck by a motor car. It seems he was about to cross the street and as he stepped off the curb to pass behind a car, the driver suddenly backed the car at a rapid pace and Mr. Anderson was knocked down and run over. He was, at once, conveyed to a hospital where every attention was given him. He was conscious when visited by Mr. and Mrs. Anderson on Saturday evening and talked with them and it was hoped that he would survive. On Sunday a change took place and he gradually grew weaker until the end came on Sunday evening. The remains arrived in Kemptville on the afternoon train and were taken to St. James' church where service was held, after which interment was made in St. James' Cemetery. The late Peter Anderson was a son of the late W.R. Anderson and as he left Kemptville about 35 years ago he will be remembered only by the older residents. Mr. and Mrs. W.H. Anderson,</p> <p>It is our sad duty to chronicle the decease, on Friday last, of a most distinguished citizen, in the person of William Henry Anderson. Because of his affable disposition and unselfish nature, it was known to only a few that the arterial trouble from which he suffered for some time was rapidly gaining headway, and when it became more generally known, six weeks ago, that his condition was precarious, the community, even his intimate friends, could not realize that his courageous fight was a forlorn hope and that the hand of death was upon him. Surrounded by nearly all of his immediate relatives, and with every comfort that loving hearts and gentle hands</p>				

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could provide, he passed peacefully away at his late home on Thomas street; and Kemptville and vicinity lost a most useful benefactor and most prominent commercial leader. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon. Born near Patterson's Corners in 1861, W.H. Anderson soon moved with his parents to Oxford Mills, where he spent his boyhood days, until at the age of fifteen he apprenticed with Murdock Gair at Oxford Mills and commenced a mercantile career, which was destined to reach its zenith in the presidency and head of the Anderson Langstaff Company, the largest concern of its kind in Eastern Ontario, apart from the cities. After serving Mr. Gair for five years he came to Kemptville in the capacity of clerk in the Blackburn store, which he eventually bought and ran in his own name until he formed a partnership with Mr. Albert Langstaff and a few years later converted the institution into the present joint stock company, of which he was the conspicuous head until his untimely end. In the thirty-seven years during which he resided in Kemptville, he made a host of friends and when one contemplates for a moment the many institutions and progressive movements with which he was at various times identified, commercial enterprises, Village Council, Board of Education, Good Roads Association, Local Postmaster, Dominion Concrete Company, War Charities, Building operations, Employment of labor, in fact, everything that spelled advancement and betterment, one cannot but conclude that the closing of this most active career leaves a void in the community which will indeed be difficult to re-fill. Courteous, cheerful, unselfish, kind, generous, sympathetic, industrious, energetic, progressive, loyal, faithful, true, shrewd, far-sighted, optimistic, a gentleman to his very fingertips, he was, in truth, a big-hearted, many-sided, broad-minded, whole-souled citizen, who "take him for all in all, we shall not look upon his like again". In politics he was a Liberal of the old school, and a devoted admirer and supporter of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He was on several occasions offered the nomination as liberal standard-bearer for this constituency, but public life had few attractions for him and he courteously declined the offer. It would be sacrilege to dwell upon the love and gentleness and simplicity that pervaded his home life. No fonder son, more loving husband, or kinder father, ever trod this good green earth. Even to see him was delight, to be with him was inspiration. The sorrowing multitude who thronged to his funeral or sent tokens of grief and sympathy, bore ample testimony of the high place he held in the hearts of the people who knew him. Besides his widow he is survived by his daughter, Mrs. D.J. Cowan of Port Arthur; his two sons, W. Garnet, barrister, of Vancouver; and Stanley G., junior member of the local firm; his mother and two sisters, Miss Lucy and Miss Jessie of Kemptville; his three brothers, Sexton, of Chalala, Wash.; James of Moston, Wis.; and Charles P., the Right Reverend Bishop of Chicago.

George Goode and Benjamin Banks of Kemptville were Instantly Killed Friday. (condensed)

A sad fatality occurred Friday afternoon at Carleton Place whereby the lives of two of Kemptville's young men were snuffed out in the twinkling of an eye, thereby plunging several homes into sorrow and grief as a result of the tragedy. George Goode, aged 25 years, and Benjamin Banks, aged 18, were instantly electrocuted when a wire on which they were working came into contact with the voltage wire of the town's electrical plant. When the news of the tragedy reached here, Messrs. William Banks and James Blakeley, left for Carleton Place to arrange for the bringing of the bodies home, arriving here on the noon train Saturday. The double funeral took place Tuesday afternoon to St. James' church where the rector, Rev. R.J. Dumbrille conducted the services after which interment was made in St. James' cemetery. Benjamin Banks, better known as "Buz", was an orphan and had been living with his uncle, Mr. William Banks previous to working for the Telephone Co. He was well-known in town where he had many friends. He leaves to mourn his loss one sister, Mrs. James Blakeley, Jr. and one brother in the States.

The late Hugh Brownlee,

The late Hugh Brownlee who passed away in the residence which had been his home in Kemptville since 1888, was born in Goulburn township, Carleton county, November 17, 1834, but when a boy, accompanied his parents to Marlboro. In 1857 he married Rebecca Morphy of Carleton Place and later, in 1861, moved to North Gower township and resided near Kars. Here Mr. Brownlee's occupation was farming at which he prospered, winning two consecutive years the medal awarded by the member for Carleton county for the best kept farm. During this time he also dealt extensively in lambs, cattle and butter, in conjunction with his farm work, and gave his efforts along this line credit for a great deal of his prosperity. He was known as one of the most progressive and successful men of the district. In 1888 he moved to Kemptville and took up his residence on North Main Street in the house in which he died. Mr. Brownlee was not a seeker of political preferment, but both in North Gower and Kemptville was honored by his fellow citizens, holding a councillorship in both communities for a number of years. In politics he was a loyal Conservative, Baptist in religion, having been an elder of the local church up to the time it disbanded. He belonged to the I.O.F. and L.O.L., North Gower. For a number of years deceased suffered from rheumatism, but was not totally disabled until September 1913, when a stroke of paralysis confined him to his bed which he was unable to leave until death released him. Mrs. Brownlee predeceased her husband in August 1913, but he is survived by four daughters and three sons: Mrs. Joseph Humphries, Cobden; Mrs. E.J. Eastman, Kemptville; Mrs. I.L. Main, Renfrew; Mrs. C.S. Lindsay, Kars; John H., Montreal; James N., Ottawa; Dr. W.J. Chicago; all of whom were present at the funeral with the exception of W.J. of Chicago. The funeral service, November 9, 1916, was held at 1.30 at the late residence of deceased, conducted by Rev. R.M. Carkner, Baptist minister of Winchester, interment at Union cemetery. A large number of friends and relatives from North Gower, Ottawa and Carleton Place attending.

He had been a prominent member of the A.O.U.W and the I.O.F. societies also for many years, was chairman of the local Board of Education, always having a deep interest in matters of an educational nature. The body of Thomas Conley, who died in Winnipeg on Wednesday of last week, arrived in Kemptville on the 11 a.m. train Monday morning and, after a service in the Methodist church, was interred in the Kemptville Public cemetery. The news of Mr. Thomas' demise caused deep regret among his many friends here, as he was a prominent resident in Kemptville prior to his departure for the west. He was born in the County of Antrim, Ireland, on the 2nd of August, 1841. After attending the public schools of his native place, he went to Belfast where he acquired a knowledge of the tailor's art in all its details, in a manner known only to those who have served their time in Great Britain or Ireland, where they do not profess to know everything but what they do know they know well. In 1858 he came to the United States where he spent three years, he then moved to Canada and settled in North Gower, where he

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entered business on his own account in 1866. During this year Mr. Conley assisted in organizing Company 4 of the 45th battalion, of which company he was first lieutenant. In 1869 he took command of the company. During the Fenian Raid in 1870 he went to Fort Wellington where he succeeded in passing the military examination and was gazetted captain, receiving his commission from Lord Monck, the Governor General. In the year 1874 Mr. Conley came to Kemptville where he built up a very successful trade. Being a man of studious habits and having that innate desire for knowledge peculiar to his nationality, he sought every opportunity of improving his mind and his surroundings. This naturally led him to take an interest in municipal affairs and as a consequence he became identified with much of the municipal history. In 1880 he was elected reeve of the village, which position he occupied for seven years at different times. In 1884 he was elected warden of the united counties of Leeds and Grenville, being one of two residents of Kemptville on whom that honour was conferred. During his term of office many important improvements were secured for Kemptville. He assisted in organizing the fire department and was its first chief. This he held for three years. During this time the steam fire engine was purchased. He was a member of the Masonic Fraternity and assisted in organizing lodge number 206 of North Gower of which he was Worshipful Master for three terms. He also held the same position in Mount Zion Lodge No. 28, Kemptville. In 1885 he was made a member of the Royal Arch Chapter in Carleton Lodge No. 16, Ottawa. In politics he was a Liberal-Conservative and a prominent member of the Methodist church. He is survived by his wife, residing at Winnipeg, three sons, George Conley, department of Indian Affairs, Ottawa; Arthur of Detroit; John of Brockville; also three daughters, Mrs. Wakefield and Miss Mary Conley, Winnipeg; Mrs. Pech, Vancouver. Mr. R. H. Conley, now deceased, who conducted a tailoring establishment on Rideau Street, Ottawa, several years ago was a son of the deceased.

The oldest citizen in Kemptville passed away to his reward on Monday morning, April 9th, when death claimed Mr. William F. Dickinson in his 94th year. In addition, there was rendered on the organ, Chopin's Marche Funebre, Beethoven's Marche Funebre D'un Pro, and Handel's Dead March in Saul. Since the death of her elder son , Charles Frederick Oliver Germain, at the battle of Vimy Ridge in April 1917, the late Mrs. Gorman had been in failing health, her frail body never recovering from the shock. Mrs. Gorman will always be remembered in Ottawa as one of the city's best known and best loved women. Although in delicate health she was one of the most indefatigable but unobtrusive workers in her husband's church. Perhaps the best testimony to her great worth was given by Bishop Roper when he said "She difused love wherever she went". 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active interest in all public matters. He was a staunch Conservative, and one whose loyalty to party and country was never questioned. He had occupied the reeve's chair of the village for several years, which carried with it a membership of the counties council. His terms were from 1880-81 and 1896-98 and during those years he served the village and country with fidelity and good judgement and was always found on the right side of every measure that meant progress, or was consistent with economy and good government. Mr. Taylor had always been a consistent and upright citizen, whose whole life reflects credit upon himself and upon the community which has so long been his home.
